# <u>Update on activity at the Lakeside and Haverthwaite Railway - July 2021</u>

#### **General Status**

The business pick up after the 17 May has continued to grow throughout June. Current passenger levels are similar to the August period last year. Given the on-line booking constraints on flexibility for customers plus the social distancing requirements, these levels continue to be encouraging but are still way short of 2019. Like many hospitality businesses we are having difficulty recruiting sufficient seasonal staff for the tea room. The covid-19 delta variant case growth is impacting the availability of some of our existing staff as they need to care for their self-isolating children due to cases in schools. We are keeping our fingers crossed that this will not effect our small team of locomotive crews. As before, the potential for relaxed social distancing from the 19 July will be critical to the success of our summer and thus our confidence in getting through the lean winter period.

The June service trains have mainly been run using Bagnall 'Victor' but Fairburn 42073 has now joined the active service fleet and is also expected to be seen running some days in July and August.

The demands of operating and maintaining the service operation have slowed activity somewhat on the other overhaul projects.

Something to watch out for: A television crew for Channel 4 were at the railway for a few days in June filming for a future episode of a 'Scenic Railways' series.

Volunteer Thomas Rotherham has passed his exams as locomotive driver, receiving his certificate on the 17 June. He is our second newly qualified driver this year. Congratulations to Tom!

### **Ivatt 2MT 46441**

Chris Beet and John McKay have continued their work on the boiler with the drilling of the throat plate stays and removal of patch screws.

Both sides of the firebox wrapper plate lower section have been removed. Photo below left shows the right hand side completed with Chris and John looking appropriately pleased with their achievement (photo below right).





Chris and team have overhauled the whistle valve linkage and refurbished the cylinder end cover studs. They have also tapped out the stud holes on the manifold and fitted new studs (photo below)



## **Hunslet Austerity 'Repulse'**

Steady progress is being made on the motion overhaul. The John Fowler & Co. engineering team is progressing well with the white-metalling of the locomotive's eccentrics at Old Hall Farm.

## **Carriage and Wagon**

Focus continues on Mk 1 TSO M3962. The corridor end strip down revealed typical Mk 1 corrosion damage. The crash pillars have been repaired and a new floor end stiffening plate fitted.
